A Letter From Your Pastor

The Future of Our Church: On Ministry to Children and Youth

Welcome to the latest edition of our quarterly newsletter! The special focus of *Attention Ascension* this time is on ministry to children and youth.

Our parish is engaged in a number of faith formation activities. Perhaps the most visible is found in our school ministry. Today Ascension school enrolls 239 children, from 3 years of age through 8th grade, an increase of over 25% from just three years ago. Our K-8 enrollment stands at 197 and is expected to grow to 210 by next fall. Our 3-year-old and junior kindergarten classes total 42, an increase of nearly 35% since 2014.

Ascension school is more than just about numbers, however. The success of our school ministry includes top-notch achievement scores, a rich variety of extracurricular activities, and an exceptional and caring faculty and administration.

The parish also initiated a catechetical program known as ANCHOR to meet the formational needs of children not attending Ascension school. The program has grown to include 31 participants, nearly double that of the time three years ago during which our religious education needs for this population were serviced by other area parishes. ANCHOR students receive a solid grounding in the Faith and join with our other young people in receiving the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and First Eucharist.

Our youth ministry program also has seen enriching results. From service opportunities to sessions on topical interests (and even a night for playing board games!), our junior and senior high youth are encouraged to stay active with the parish. We have also initiated efforts to expand our lay liturgical ministry roles, including cantors and lectors, to feature opportunities for young people to serve.

We conduct all of these and other activities in a challenging environment. And we also do so being mindful that parents are FIRST and BEST EDUCATORS!

And as the first and best educators, parents are being encouraged not only to bring their children to Mass but also to come to the Eucharist themselves: every weekend!

Research from several sources clearly demonstrate that young people, active and growing in the Faith:

- Attend Mass more frequently than others less connected with the Catholic Church;
- Report higher levels of understanding and practice of the Faith;
- Have parents and other adults in their lives with whom they can share not only their faith experiences but also the range of other life experiences; and
- Are less likely to engage in socially negative behaviors (e.g., alcohol abuse, etc.).


At the Church of the Ascension, we strive mightily to include, empower and enliven the Faith of our children and youth. But this effort is one requiring the engagement of all!

Let us pray for and act upon those steps necessary to build up the Faith and ensure the continuing vibrancy of the Roman Catholic Church in southeast Louisville.

To our wonderful parish:

This has been such an exciting year for youth ministry! We've gotten our junior high boys' and girls' youth ministries off the ground, walked with our eighth grade class through the Confirmation process, and participated in service for the

parish and the community. We continue to raise money for our high school Appalachia mission trip in June, work with the 7th grade on Catholic Social Teaching, and prepared eighth grader Tim Profumo to join the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil Mass.

We've also seen the beginning of the Family Faith Night, a night when youth and their families come together for a prayer service, dinner, and a speaker. We've had talks on the fair trade movement, environmental stewardship, and the refugee experience, and we have an upcoming talk on urban poverty and Catholic social teaching. I've been blessed to see our youth grow tremendously at these events.

In the past few months, I've learned so much from the youth of this parish. I've seen a strong commitment to community and a wonderful eagerness to serve. I especially saw this when interviewing our eighth graders before their Confirmation; I heard remarkable stories of how these young people connected with others through service, and especially how they've inherited a passion for justice from adult role models in their own lives. One young lady told me about how last Christmas, her older cousin got all of the cousins together to shop for a family in need; I heard from another about his grandfather, and how he always feels comfortable going to him when he has questions about his faith.

I'd like to send this message to parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles, teachers, and any other adults in our young people's lives: keep doing what you're doing! Whether you realize it or not,

you are a role model for them, and you are making a tremendous difference. Together we can enrich the lives of our youth and lead them deeper into communion with God and all his children.

The Practice Behind the Passion: How We Teach This is part one of a three-part series that will run in the next few newsletters By: Terry Mullaney, Ascension School Principal

At Ascension, we are working diligently to set ourselves apart from other

schools in how we teach and what we offer. We are already the first school in KY to offer 1:1 ipads in kindergarten through eighth grades. We are also the only Catholic school to provide training in Project Based Learning to all of our faculty, who are now implementing in each classroom. We are the only elementary school in KY offering 8th grade trips to Marine Biology Camp in California and Zion, Bryce and Grand Canyon National Parks. Our students are the beneficiaries of all of this as they experience intellectual stimulation, risk, collaboration and knowledge growth.

There is more: our explosive growth over the last 4 ½ years has led to continued probing into "how do you all do it?" from those within the Ascension community as well as those part of other schools and communities. Here now is a look at some of the methods being employed in our classrooms to challenge and prepare our students.

*Differentiated Instruction

Based on the knowledge that not all students are alike, differentiated instruction is an approach to teaching that gives students multiple options for absorbing information and making sense of ideas. Differentiated instruction is based on the premise that instructional approaches should vary and be adapted in relation to individual and diverse students. Differentiated instruction is a model that requires teachers to be flexible in their approach to teaching and adjust the curriculum, presentation of information, and assessment to the students rather than expecting students to adapt themselves to the curriculum. This approach empowers our teachers to provide re-teaching and enrichment to every student. (Carol Tomlinson)

*Scaffolding

Scaffolding is the provision of sufficient support to promote learning when concepts and skills are first introduced to students. Common elements of scaffolding include: task definition, direct or indirect instruction, specification and sequencing of activities, provision of materials, equipment and facilities, modeling through a think aloud instructional strategy, and planning, organizing, and reflecting on the specific task. Teachers help students master a task or a concept by providing support. An example of scaffolding would be: The teacher describes or illustrates a concept, problem, or process in multiple ways to ensure understanding. A teacher may orally describe a concept to students, use a slideshow with visual aids such as images and graphics to further explain the idea, ask several students to illustrate the concept on the blackboard, and then provide the students with a reading and writing task that asks them to articulate the concept in their own words. This strategy addresses the multiple ways in which students learn—e.g., visually, orally, kinesthetically, etc.--and increases the likelihood that students will understand the concept being taught. (Lev Vgotsky, Jerome Brunner)
